

Q7) Growth of trade Unions help to put
on end to the idea of laissez faire?

Many of the laws to protect workers have
been due to the pressure from the workers
trade Unions.

And, so laws & acts were made against
'laissez faire' as idea launched by Adam
Smith in 1776 in the book named The
Wealth of Nations.

Trade Unions is a group of Industrial
workers to protest against 'doctrine'
any other forceful application / principles
made by Economist behind Capitalist's
favourable condition with the help / support
of Socialist.

At first, when English workers
formed trade Unions, employers called
them 'unlawful combinations' & laws were
passed to curb such 'evils'. Industrial
workers didn't have right to vote / couldn't
be involved in any decision of Parliament.
But both matters were resolved later in
favor of Industrial workers, so by 1824
they succeeded & there was a remarkable
growth in Unions of all trades & in
b/w 1830 - 1840, there launched the

movement known as 'Chartist movement',
to get the right of vote for workers.

To conclude we can say,
Trade Unions led to 'New laws' &
'New movement' which declined over
the time i.e. about in 1850's. But their
Impact / Influence was the complete
shadow existing & gradually through
the Act of 1867, 1882, 1918, 1929 all
adult citizens were enfranchised.
Therefore, the English workers also won
the right not only to organize 'Trade
Unions' but also the right to strike
to force employers to concede their de-
mands.
